# JUROR'S STATEMENT

Maclovio Cantú IV (b.1990) originally from South Bend, Indiana where he earned a Bachelor of Fine Arts from Indiana University South Bend with a double concentration in Drawing and Painting. Maclovio earned a Master of Fine Arts with concentration in Printmaking Texas A&M University Corpus Christi. Maclovio is Assistant Professor and head of the Printmaking department at University of Texas Tyler.

Maclovio's intensive investigation into the creation, evolution, and history of the lowrider has led to development of expressions in the ChicanX term Rasquachismo. This sensibility is suffused through his projects including paintings, prints and an unlikely connection made to the art of quilting. With this Maclovio identifies as Post-Disciplinary since the only thing that will put his technique in a box is death

These principles are reflected in low-rider creation and culture. They start with a vision and evolve over time by salvaging, modifying, repainting, and refinishing to become a new iteration from the original. Maclovio's works are created through *Rasquachismo* sensibility and serve both as an homage to low-rider history, the neighborhoods that formed his identity and aesthetics.
